Moana Jackson is a New Zealand Māori lawyer specialising in Treaty of

Waitangi and constitutional issues. Jackson is of Ngāti Kahungunu and Ngāti Porou descent. He is Director of Nga Kaiwhakamarama i Nga Ture (the Māori Legal Service) which he co-founded in 1987. He graduated in Law and Criminology at Victoria University of Wellington, and after a short period in practice took up the teaching of Maori language. He then undertook further study in the United States before returning to New Zealand to conduct research for the then Justice Department report on the Maori and the criminal justice system, He Whaipanga Hou. His report was published in 1988.

He is an experienced educator and practitioner and has been an advisor and professional development provider for Special Education Services and the Ministry of Education on a number of national projects. His interest is the exploration of cultural concepts and strategies that affect positively on professional practice, on which he published widely.

In 2010 Angus was presented with the Tohu Pae Tawhiti Award to acknowledge his significant contribution to Māori research. His most recent book, *Responsive Pedagogy*, was published in October 2011.
